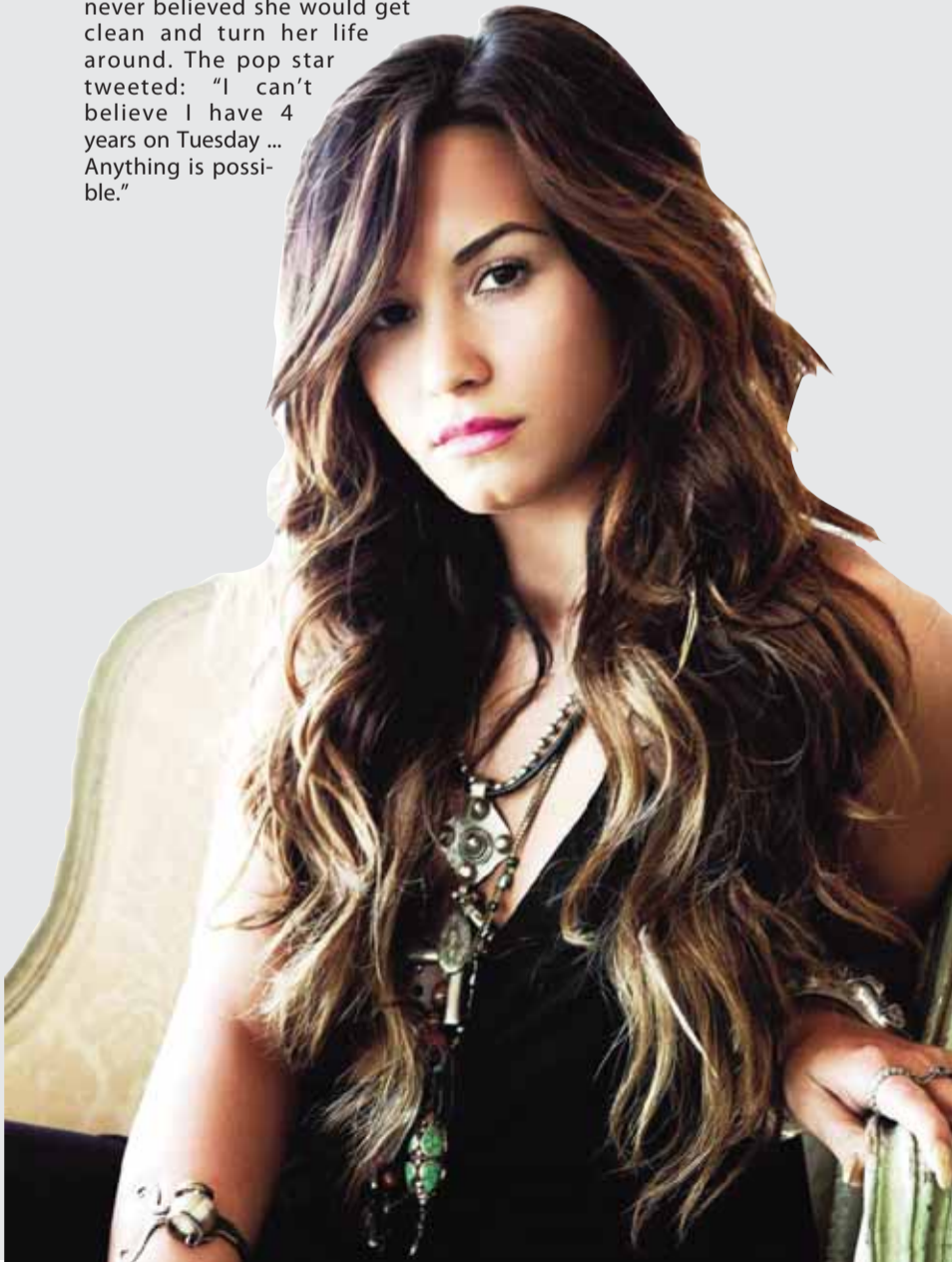

'grateful' for every supportive message

The 'Cool for the Summer' singer reached the sobriety milestone on Tuesday and admits she has been blown away with the huge volume of "shout outs" for her acknowledging her personal achievement. She posted on Twitter: "So many incredible "4 year" shout outs from radio stations, tv channels, magazines, and most importantly my fans ... I'm so unbelievably grateful for every single tweet, every comment, every text and every call. I love all of you ... It IS possible!!! (sic)" The pop star checked into rehab in 2010 at the age of 19 to be treated for alcohol and drug abuse, as well as an eating disorder and persistent self-harming. Demi, now 23, has never fallen off the wagon since confronting her demons head on. Tweeting on her sobriety anniversary earlier in the week, Demi posted online: "This last year I experienced so much life and too much death ... But I made it through ... Sober. #4Years #GodsWill (sic)" Another cryptic tweet which seemed to refer to the cycle of life, read: "Most people die but others just go ... She's still out there and the chasm grows ... Steady are the feet in the morning glow. (sic)" Demi - who is in a relationship with Wilmer Valderrama - also urged her fans to believe "anything is possible" because during her darkest days she never believed she would get clean and turn her life around. The pop star tweeted: "I can't believe I have 4 years on Tuesday ... Anything is possible."

50 Cent will host his own variety show

The 'In Da Club' hitmaker's dream of fronting his own program has come true as he will present and executive produce the new series '50 Cent Presents', which will include the "best" music performances, comedy sketches, magic and celebrity guest appearances. Speaking to The Hollywood Reporter, the star - real name Curtis Jackson - said: "I grew up watching variety shows and am excited to put my own spin on the format. I hope everyone is ready to bring their talent forward, I want to show the world the best of the best." The series will mark 50 Cent's latest venture into television, having starred in education documentary, 'Dream School', and crime drama 'Power'. He is also set to play himself in upcoming comedy 'My Friend 50', which will follow an unstable youngster who attempts to breach 50's entourage. Meanwhile, the singer songwriter is currently battling with bankruptcy, which saw him appear in court to justify his recent Instagram posts flaunting cash to boost his reputation. The 'Candy Shop' hitmaker - who filed for bankruptcy last July - defended a number of his social media postings in a court submission filed earlier this month, insisting the images were not indicative of his actual wealth but were prop dollars used for music videos and photo shoots. He stated: "As a hip-hop artist and entertainer, it is imperative that I continue to project inspirational goals of success in order to preserve my brand and those I represent. "What I say and what I do on social media has a direct impact on my

music sales and the viewership on my television shows." As well as defending his fake cash, 50 Cent also filed a debt-repayment plan, which will aim to pay out \$23 million over the next five years, for the judge to approve.
